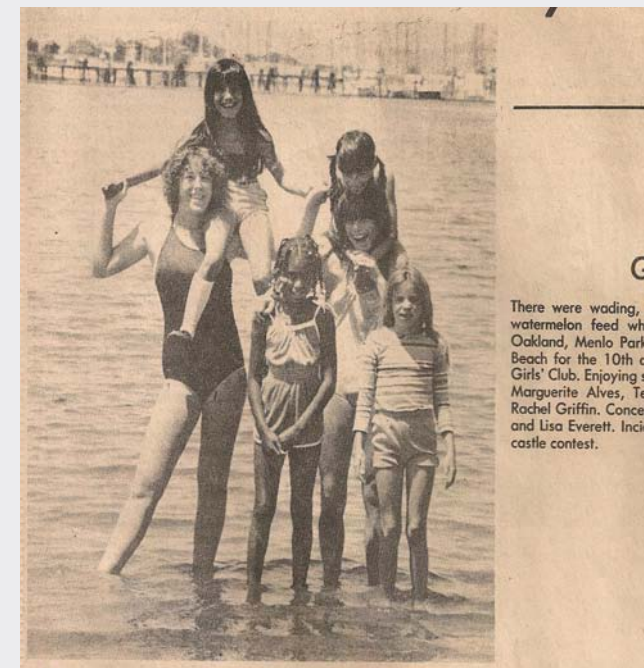

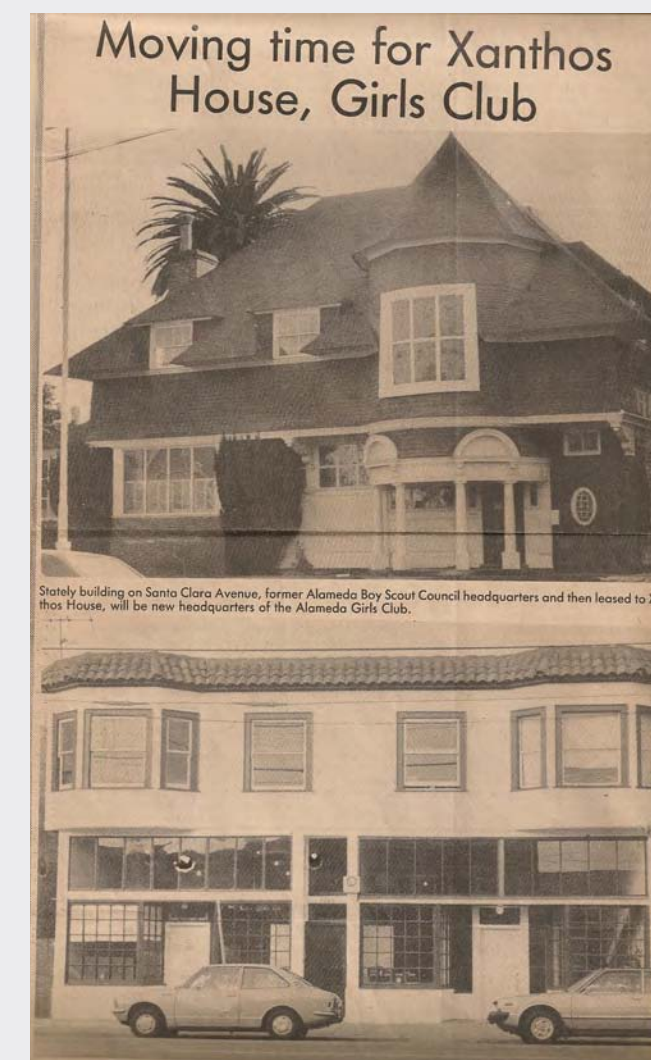

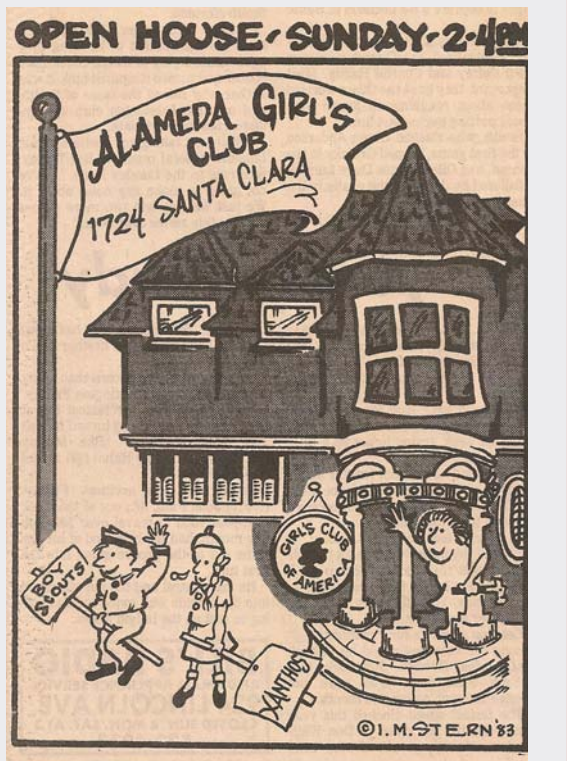


Alameda Girls' Club purchased new building formerly owned by the Alameda Boy Scout Council that was leased to Xanthos.
