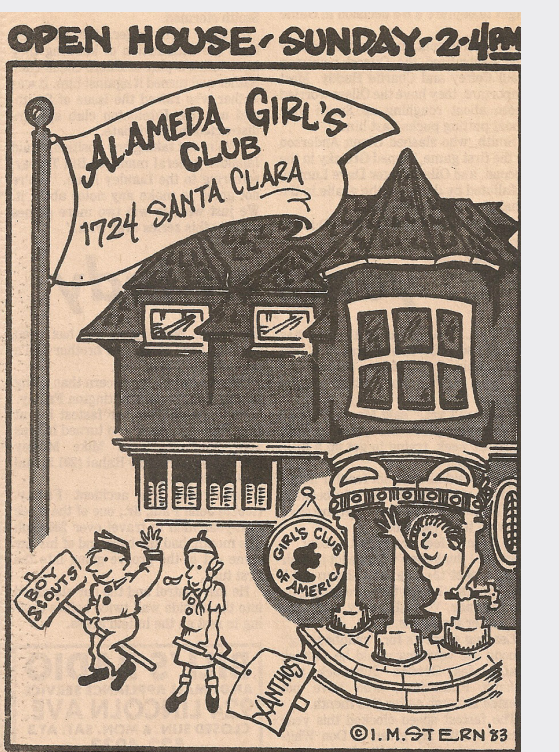
**It's moving time for two big social service agencies**
